Consistent with board policy: SB 1 provides that most school council policies shall be "consistent with local board policy" and help the school meet schoolwide and district goals. This does not mean that the school board dictates what the SBDM policy says. Rather, the SBDM policy must not conflict with areas in which the board has authority or jurisdiction such as funding, budget, and personnel matters.
