- A PEAR DECK FOR CLOSE READS. Loraine Hammerbeck. Bullitt Central HS, LWP XXXVIII Curious about Pear Deck for Google slides but haven't had a chance to try it? Loraine Hammerbeck will share her experience building and using Pear Deck to conduct a close reading of The Lottery in this seminar. Find out how easy and engaging Pear Deck can make it is to use for short texts and learn how other teachers at BCHS have used Pear Deck in the English secondary classroom. MS/HS. Room 101.

- E LOOKING FOR AN ANALYTIC STAR? Rhonda Nett, Co-Director, duPont Manual HS, LWP XXI. Students often see themselves as the stars of their every academic endeavor. This can be a complicating factor in moving students from reader-focused text-thinking, in which students, their connections, their strategies, etc. are front and center, to analysis, in which the text and the writer are the divas in the spotlight. This session will consider strategies to make students feel like they are still in charge, even when the writing is not overtly all about them. HS. Room 109.
- F POWERING YOUR STUDENTS' STORIES. Dr. Deanna Mascle, Morehead WP, KCTE, Morehead State University and Sarah Webster, Morehead WP, KCTE, Gallatin County HSI. Harness the power of the National Writing Project to inspire your young writers to share their overlooked and misunderstood stories about their communities. In this session we share the lessons and strategies we used to help our developing journalists during our Power Your Story Journalism Camp including interactive strategies to develop questions and conduct interviews as well as dig deeper into their topics to find the compelling and powerful stories they must tell. - J ORGANIZING EVIDENCE LESSON SEQUENCE USING DOLLAR GENERAL TEXT SET. Suzanne Jackson, KWP C3WP Co-Director, LWP XIX-2 Check out NWP's newest Organizing Evidence Lesson Sequence using the newly designed Dollar General text set. Help middle and high school students understand how to sift through information to draft a nuanced claim and support their arguments with compelling evidence. Grades 6-12. Room 101.
- K RETHINKING RUBRICS: SUPPORTING SECONDARY AND POST-SECONDARY STUDENTS THROUGH SELF-CONSTRUCTED RUBRICS FOR PEER REVISION. Karen Dunnagan, Ph.D., and Kristen Harris, Ph.D., College of Education, Spalding University, Louisville. Research in composition has indicated less than positive impact on critical and creative thinking related to academic writing performances formulated to meet instructordesigned prompts and summative scoring rubrics. When high school and college students are afforded time to examine appropriate mentor texts, along with opportunities to review other students' written work, they are empowered and enthused to design what may be termed "work in progress" rubrics that enhance their participation in peer revision. In this session, examples of student writing and student-developed "process rubrics" will be shared to offer ideas for secondary and post-secondary instruction that moves writers toward independence with confidence. Secondary (8-12) and Post-secondary. Room 103.

- L ACTION IS ELOQUENCE: MAKING STRATEGIC MOVES TO SUPPORT WRITING TO DEMONSTRATE LEARNING. Dr. Sandra Hogue, LWP Co-Director. Participants will explore KDE resources on writing to demonstrate learning and develop a plan of action to prepare students to demonstrate their best writing work. Grades 4-12. Room 106.
- M FINDING JUST THE RIGHT EVIDENCE. Erin Dennis Ed.S., Eminence Elem, LWP XXXVI. How long did it take Goldilocks to find the right bed? Do your students wander away from the claim when using evidence? Is it difficult to have students asking the right questions when identifying credible sources? Instead of spending time watching Goldilocks try out all the beds till she finds the right one, this lesson plan created by the National Writing Project as part of C3WP makes finding the right evidence very easy to understand and fun. Using the pre-created resources, students work together and collaborate to find the evidence they need to support their claim. We will closely look at identifying credible sources, prioritizing evidence by theme, and clearly relating evidence to the claim. C3WP lesson for Upper Elementary. Room 108.
- N INTERACTIVE WRITING FOR EMERGENT WRITERS (ALONG WITH A REUNION OF THE KID WRITING ACADEMY PARTICIPANTS). Sheryl Block, LWP Coordinator of Professional Learning and Melissa Lowe, K-1 Bullitt Co. Teacher. Let's investigate and explore this powerful instructional strategy to support emergent writers. We'll discuss the purposes, techniques and strategies associated with interactive writing, so you can apply to your development of writers. Come hear information about upcoming Kid Writing Academy opportunities. O EXPLICIT INSTRUCTION IN THE ELEMENTARY WRITER'S WORKSHOP. Cara Caudill, LWP Co-Director. How do we make an intrinsic skill clear for our youngest writers? This session will focus on Explicit Instruction strategies that you can use regularly in your classroom. Empower young communicators with these simple routines to provide them with the rehearsal and clarity they need to become independent writers. Elementary. Room 109.

- P IGNITE STUDENTS' PASSION FOR WRITING WITH KET'S YOUNG WRITERS CONTEST AND PBS LEARNINGMEDIA! Larry Moore, KET Education Consultant for the North Central Region of Kentucky. Light the creative spark that encourages emerging young authors (grades K-12) to tell their stories with KET's Young Writers Contest. Explore how the Contest, as well as a variety of resources within PBS LearningMedia, can support and reward young writers on their journey through the writing process from research and effective literary techniques, to writing for authentic audiences and beyond. In this session, we will look at the trials and triumphs of attempting to motivate students by going gradeless—not totally gradeless though. Allowing students choice in topic can sometimes be challenging to manage because we want to ensure that students will find credible sources.
