

8:00 - 9:20 Choice of Sessions:

- A TAKING WRITING ONLINE WITH GOOGLE CLASSROOM AND MINECRAFT. Mary-Adele Allison, 3rd Grade Teacher/Klondike Lane Elementary School, LWP XVII. In this session, we will explore various instructional strategies using Google Classroom, Google Tools, and Minecraft that give students an authentic purpose for writing as well as systematic instruction and feedback. As with any writing instruction, it is more effectively tied to an in-person Writers' Workshop but it can also be used as an asynchronous project. All Levels. Room 232

 Experience a National Writing Project lesson cycle that introduces middle/high school students to countering in the context of current issues. Resources have been vetted in schools across the country as part of the College, Career, and Community Writers Program (C3WP). In this presentation the audience will learn how to set up a blog on EduBlogs to allow a virtual place for students to write comfortably. I will demonstrate how the blog works for the teacher and how students interact with it. I will also discuss establishing blog norms, setting kids up with handles/aliases,

and provide student samples from the actual blog used during the 21-22 school year. Additionally, the presentation will cover the benefits of using a blog during the pandemic--how it allows for flexibility with student follow-through in regard to the completion of work and for the collection and storage of student writing. - E TEACHING FEELING SPECIFIC VOCABULARY TO SUPPORT STUDENTS IN SOCIAL **EMOTIONAL** LEARNING AND TO **ENHANCE EXPRESSIVE** JOURNALING AND POETRY, Christopher Robbins, Emotional Behavior Teacher at Simpsonville Elementary, LWP XL. After working with many students at the elementary level, it became clear that students' vocabulary in expressing their emotions were limited to happy or sad. This in turn makes it difficult to truly understand what is happening internally with the students. This leads to more acting out behavior, and not addressing the emotional needs of the student. This session will give ideas and strategies to teach emotional specific vocabulary so that a student is able to give a better insight to their feelings, and positive ways to express their feelings through journaling and poetry. Dr. Sandra Hogue, ELA Lead of Accelerated Improvement Schools of Jefferson County, LWP XIX-3. Join us as we share the journey of two elementary teacher teams collaborating to develop and deliver a unit of study that empowers students as influencers of academic spaces within and beyond their school. While this session features an elementary school's journey, the content is applicable at all levels. Room 110
- USING WRITER'S NOTEBOOKS TO INTRODUCE COMPOSITION TO YOUNG WRITERS. Amy Sandmann, Hartstern Elementary, LWP XL. For many younger writers, the focus has been more on writing mechanics and genre specific writing than generating and expanding their own ideas. The writer's notebook is the perfect place to plant the seeds of an idea and allow that idea to grow and change. The

ideas presented were gathered in a fifth grade classroom, but could be modified for a wide range of ages and learners. **Elementary. Room 116**

- O ADDRESSING SOCIAL-EMOTIONAL LEARNING AND PREPARING FOR ARGUMENT WRITING THROUGH PERSONIFICATION POEM - FEATURING GHETTO BUT US (STUDENT PUBLICATION). Dr. Kimberly Mucker-Johnson. One way to make sense of you and your world is by identifying what is positively or negatively affecting you. Research is prevailing that the process of writing empowers you to be able to sort through your emotions, thoughts, and actions. As I was working with a former student, Cherish Wilson, on her first book of poetry, Ghetto But Us, I noticed in one of the poems that Wilson had personified schizophrenia. She assigned human characteristics to this mental health illness, so that she could have a conversation with "Schizophrenia" about how it had affected the relationship between her and her mother. Since I was aware that we had all been living through a pandemic for a couple of years, I decided to provide a platform for my current students to identify and personify something in their lives that was affecting them. The results were AMAZING. Come to this session and find out more about how you can empower your students to process their own lives using Personification Poems, and how to use these poems as springboards for informational and argumentative writing. - P WRITING IN ELEMENTARY MATHEMATICS. Delaney S. Bush, LWP XL, Minors Lane Elementary. Since writing is thinking, I wanted to devise a way for fourth graders to write/think beyond the procedures in mathematics. After some trial-and-error, our class adopted the Claim Evidence Reasoning process in mathematics (as well as other classes). We will experience abbreviated number talks, math vocabulary review, and an exit ticket with the CER. You will examine student work, hear from the kids, and have an opportunity to consider how to adapt it to your classroom and situation. Elementary. Room 151
